Introduction to Ethics Fall 2021 Chapman University

Course Description

This course provides an introduction to problems of *moral philosophy*, or *ethics*. We begin by examining certain problems that arise when making moral judgments, such as whether ideas of moral rightness or wrongness are specific to a certain culture, and what is the appropriate object of moral evaluation—whether it be a character trait or a deficiency in motivation to act on duty, say. Next, we turn to the moral, social, and political philosophy of John Stuart Mill, and carefully consider his analysis of the basis of moral rightness in *Utilitarianism* and the justification of state infringement on individual freedom in *On Liberty*. Finally, we examine seminal philosophical writings on a range of controversial contemporary moral issues, including abortion, animal rights, and the legalization of drug use. We will be interested in considering what general principles are suggested by our moral judgments about these cases, as well as the implications they have for various moral theories.
